Federal Court “Vacates” FDA Laboratory Developed Tests Rule

A federal judge in Texas has [struck down](#) the U.S. Food and Drug Administration’s (FDA) laboratory developed tests (LDT) [final rule](#). The court ruled in favor of plaintiffs from the American Clinical Laboratory Association (ACLA), the Association for Molecular Pathology (AMP), *et al.*, “setting aside and vacating” the FDA’s LDT final rule which had been set to take effect on May 6th. The judge stated in his ruling that the LDT regulation exceeded the FDA’s statutory authority.

The court’s decision means that blood centers do not have to comply with the final rule. America’s Blood Centers (ABC) has advocated with both the FDA and Congress for an [exemption](#) for LDTs used by blood centers from reforms to diagnostics regulation and made this a priority in its [2025 Advocacy Agenda](#). In an April 1st [statement](#), ABC Chief Executive Officer Kate Fry, MBA, CAE said, “[t]he court’s ruling marks a significant victory for the laboratory community and the patients they serve, protecting *in vitro* diagnostic products (IVDs) from unprecedented regulatory scrutiny. ABC has long advocated that FDA does not have the authority to regulate laboratory developed tests. FDA’s final rule would have delayed patient care, increased costs, stifled innovation, and resulted in resource diversion — all of which would have compromise[d] the efficiency and effectiveness of blood center operations. We will continue to oppose any effort that unnecessarily restricts access to life-saving tests for patients in need.”

The judge’s ruling cited the Supreme Court’s *Loper Bright v. Raimondo* case, where the Supreme Court [ruled](#) that courts may no longer defer to the expertise of a federal agency when interpreting ambiguous language in the law pertaining to the work of that agency. ABC previously stated that the Loper ruling would likely impact litigation on the LDT final rule. The FDA can choose to appeal this decision to the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. ABC will continue to monitor and provide updates to member blood centers on this and our advocacy efforts as they become available. Please [contact us](#) with any questions. ♦

REGULATORY NEWS

ABC has been informed that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Advisory Committee on Blood and Tissue Safety and Availability (ACBTSA) no longer exists following the closure of the Office of Infectious Disease and HIV/AIDS Policy (OIDP) within HHS. This Federal Advisory Committee had existed in some form since 1997 and provided advice to the HHS secretary through the assistant secretary for Health on a range of policy issues related to blood, blood products, and tissues. 💧

WORD IN WASHINGTON

Mehmet Oz, MD, MBA has been [confirmed](#) as administrator of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). He succeeds CMS Chief of Staff Stephanie Carlton who had been serving as acting administrator of the agency.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently [approved](#) Qfitlia (fitusiran), “for routine prophylaxis to prevent or reduce the frequency of bleeding episodes in adult and pediatric patients 12 years of age and older with hemophilia A or hemophilia B, with or without factor VIII or IX inhibitors (neutralizing antibodies).” According to an agency news release, the treatment, “Qfitlia does not replace the missing clotting factor. Rather, it reduces the amount of a protein called antithrombin, leading to an increase in thrombin, an enzyme critical for blood clotting. [Its] safety were assessed in two multicenter, randomized clinical trials which enrolled a total of 177 adult and pediatric male patients with either hemophilia A or hemophilia B... The primary measure of efficacy of Qfitlia was the estimated annualized bleeding rate of treated bleeds. In the participants with inhibitors who received the antithrombin-based dosing regimen of Qfitlia, there was a 73 percent reduction in estimated annualized bleeding rate compared to those who received on-demand treatment with bypassing agents. In participants without inhibitors who received the antithrombin-based dosing regimen of Qfitlia, there was a 71 percent reduction in estimated annualized bleeding rate compared to those who received on-demand treatment with clotting factor concentrates.”

RESEARCH IN BRIEF

The Impact of RBC Storage Age on Acute Kidney Injury. Authors of a pre-planned [sub-study](#) in *Transfusion* examined the standard issue transfusion versus fresher red-cell use in intensive care in the TRANSFUSE trial. They explained that the study, “aimed to test the hypothesis that, compared to standard care, transfusion of the freshest available allogeneic red blood cell (RBC) unit would decrease the incidence of acute kidney injury (AKI) in critically ill patients who required RBC transfusion in the intensive care unit (ICU).” The paper noted that, “[p]atients included [those who were admitted to one of the 31 participating sites and who did not already have Kidney Disease Improving Global Outcomes (KDIGO) Stage three AKI at the time of randomization (i.e., renal failure requiring renal replacement therapy or serum creatinine higher than four mg/dL or greater than three times the preadmission value).” The study featured 899 patients for analysis [who] were mostly male (53 percent) with a mean age of 61.3 years (standard deviation (SD) 18).” The authors explained that, “[t]he mean RBC storage duration was 22.4 (SD 7.5) and 11.9 (SD 5.4) days, in the standard issue RBC and short-storage RBC groups respectively (p<.0001). The maximum RBC storage duration was also significantly higher in the standard issue RBC group than in the short-storage RBC group (25.4 [SD 8.7] vs. 13.8 [SD 7.2] days, p<.0001).” The researchers noted that, “[t]he percentage of patients who developed any stage of new AKI between randomization and ICU discharge was similar between groups (24.8 percent in the standard issue RBC group vs. 26.1 percent in the short-storage RBC group, p=.66) (RR 0.95, [95 percent CI 0.76–1.19]). A total of 21 patients (2.3 percent) developed Stage three AKI and only 7 (0.9 percent) required renal replacement therapy in the ICU, without any difference between study groups (RR 0.62, [95 percent CI 0.26–1.49]). Nineteen percent of patients developed new stage one AKI in the standard issue RBC group versus 18.1 percent in the short-storage RBC group (p=.61); and 4.6 percent stage two AKI without difference between groups.” The study concluded that, “the transfusion of the freshest available RBC was not associated with a decrease in AKI.” The “findings do not suggest any harm to kidney function from transfusion of standard issue RBC compared to shorter-term storage RBC in this population.”
