Blood Community Responds to Revised HIV Guidance

America's Blood Centers (ABC), the Association for the Advancement of Blood & Biotherapies (AABB), and the American Red Cross submitted joint comments to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) guidance titled "Recommendations for Evaluating Donor Eligibility Using Individual Risk-Based Questions to Reduce the Risk of Human Immunodeficiency Virus Transmission by Blood and Blood Products; Draft Guidance for Industry." In the comments, the blood community expressed their support for "evidence-based decision-making to update donor eligibility requirements" also requesting that the agency replace individual risk assessment with individual donor assessment in the final guidance "to remove the negative connotation perceived by donors and the public."

The comments urged the agency to address donor use of pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP), and antiretroviral therapies (ART) by requesting that "federal government partners join FDA in protecting the safety of the blood supply by actively promoting consistent messaging at every opportunity to the public." The blood community also advocated for timely evaluation of evidencebased decisions to update requirements for blood products to determine where similar updates can be appropriately applied to requirements for biotherapy products."

Additionally, the blood community asked the agency to assist with messaging on implementation timelines by "establish[ing] public messaging noting FDA's landmark decision and emphasizing our collective commitment to sustaining the high level of safety for our blood supply." In particular, communicating landmark changes, such as those proposed by FDA, must "be implemented with a commitment to safety over speed to maintain the public's trust in the blood supply [and] require extensive staff training and education, [along with] patience and public support for blood donor centers supplying transfusion services to meet the needs of patients across the country."

The blood community also requested that implementation "recognize the challenges and extended implementation timelines based on the collection of plasma for further manufacture."

The comments also provided:

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- recommendations on "clarification [of the] reference to 'positive test' verses 'confirmed positive test;'"
- recommendations on clarification of "sexual contact with a person who has 'ever had a positive test for HIV' versus a 'confirmed positive test for HIV;"
- recommendations on the "definition of a 'new partner;" and
- recommendations on "calculating the donor deferral period."

The blood community concluded the comments by recognizing the FDA's "commitment to evidence-based donor eligibility recommendations to support the safety and availability of the blood supply" and expressing gratitude for the agency's willingness to "work with us as we review the published data supporting the recommendations in the final guidance and prepare for the complex implementation process which will follow."

WORD IN WASHINGTON

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced <u>clarification</u> to its COVID-19 Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) declarations. A notice published in the *Federal Register* stated that EUAs for biological and medical products issued during the COVID-19 public health emergency (PHE) "will remain in effect" after the conclusion of the COVID-19 PHE on May 11th. EUAs are independent of the PHE declaration by the administration.

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), an agency of HHS, introduced a "modernization initiative" aimed at improving "accountability and transparency" in the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network (OPTN). As part of the agency's plan, The United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) will no longer be the lone government contractor for the nation's organ transplant system. "Patients will be better served 'by ensuring there's competition in this process and that we're getting best-in-class' to handle the different transplant functions," <u>said</u> HRSA Administrator Carole Johnson to the *Associated Press*. The new initiative also includes a "new data dashboard to share de-identified information on organ donors, organ procurement, transplant waitlists, and transplant recipients. Patients, families, clinicians, researchers, and others can use this data to inform decision-making as well as process

President Biden's proposed fiscal year 2024 budget "would more than double HRSA's budget for organ-related work, including OPTN contracting and the implementation of the modernization initiative, to total \$67 million."

The Human Rights Campaign (HRC) Foundation has <u>published</u> its <u>findings</u> on the potential impact of the current U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) blood donor deferral policy and the proposed shift to individual donor assessments. Specifically, the HRC examined the reactions on those who are part of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer (LGBTQ+) community. According to the HRC Foundation data, 72.3 percent of respondents "believe the proposed policy is still discriminatory, as a significant number of individuals would still be ineligible to donate. Nearly 90 percent believe the federal government needs to prioritize investing in more technologies and research to expand eligibility." Kelley Robinson, president of the HRC, added in the news release, "[a]lthough these new proposed guidelines are

a real step forward in ending blood donation discrimination, they are still lacking in some key ways — namely, the continued ban on individuals using PrEP. This report shows that the LGBTQ+ community sees blood donation discrimination as a major issue to be remedied, and unfortunately the updated policy would still implicitly discriminate against many in our community. We're calling on the federal government to further invest in research and technology so that more people can donate blood and save lives while maintaining the safety of the blood supply."

San Diego Blood Bank (SDBB) has <u>finished</u> it solar-plus-storage project. According to a blood center announcement, the project included "rooftop solar with battery storage, two new bloodmobiles that have been outfitted with batteries and solar panels that have made it possible to replace the two diesel power generators needed to operate the lights, [air conditioning], and equipment on these new buses, and two Tesla blood delivery vehicles, one of which was generously funded by the Walter J. and Betty C. Zable Foundation." The news release also stated that "the energy storage system, rooftop, and carport solar system will provide shade and 100 percent renewable energy to help charge the batteries on SDBB's two new bloodmobiles. The system is expected to generate 1,500,000 kWh annually of renewable energy and allow SDBB to generate and store that energy to use when electricity costs are highest."

GLOBAL NEWS

The Sydney Morning Herald reported this week that Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA), Australia's regulatory authority, is "prioritizing" review of a submission from Australian Red Cross Lifeblood that "all questions relating to sexual encounters be removed from the plasma donor questionnaire." According to the publication, Lifeblood's "plasma pathway" application, if approved, would allow "gay and bisexual men, as well as [individuals] taking HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), [to] be able to donate [plasma] without any wait time regardless of sexual activity as long as they met all other eligibility criteria." The application is based on research data and modelling from Lifeblood which "found there would be no change to the current safety profile of Australia's blood supply due to the additional safety precaution involved in processing blood plasma known as pathogen [inactivation]." According to the news outlet, the proposed change would make Australia the first nation to implement such a policy as "Australia has the largest plasma collection program per-capita [worldwide]." Lifeblood Chief Medical Officer Joanne Pink told the publication, "[y]ou can imagine in a country where there is a very small plasma program this type of change would not be feasible, but we are in a very good position to be able to do this.

We want to ensure that as many people as possible can safely donate. I think it's fantastic because it's the most inclusive option and great for donor experience because we won't need to ask questions about sexual activity." She also added that "we would make this change if we did not think it was safe for patients."

The Netherlands is set to <u>implement</u> changes to its blood donation policies for sexually active gay and bisexual men by January 2024, according to the *NL Times*. The publication stated that with this change "all blood donors will receive the same [questions on the donor history] questionnaires to fill out starting early next year to determine whether their blood or plasma is safe to use...Sexual behavior will still be a factor when considering the risk of blood-borne infections. Currently, sexually active gay and bisexual men are only allowed to donate if they have been in a monogamous relationship for an extended time or if they have not had sex for the four months prior to donating."

COMPANY NEWS

Graphite Bio, Inc. has "<u>discontinued</u>" development of its investigational gene therapy to treat sickle cell disease. According to a news release, the company will explore the feasibility of external development of the gene therapy. This announcement came in the wake of January <u>announcement</u> that a voluntary hold had been placed on a phase I/II trial of the investigational gene therapy candidate following a "serious and unexpected adverse event of prolonged low blood cell counts (pancytopenia) requiring ongoing transfusion and growth factor support in the first patient dosed."
